Paul's Letter to the Galatians: A Taste

Martin Luther referred affectionately to *Paul's Letter to the Galatians* as "My Katie." In *Galatians* Luther found the "most holy Gospel of Jesus Christ" in concentrated form. Luther would Lecture on *Galatians* in 1516-17, 1519, and later in 1531. The latter two lecture series were published in 1535, still provide a fundamental framework for understanding Luther's theology to this day for scholars and non-scholars alike.

Consisting of six relatively short chapters, Paul's Letter to the Galatians also provides an excellent entry point for reading the New Testament; for beginning the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the nature of Christian Freedom.

By no means an exhaustive outline, the intent behind this year's Sermon Series is provide a taste of the Gospel of Jesus Christ according to one of its most concentrated expressions in the New Testament, or *Paul's Letter to the Galatians.* Join us.

Submitted herewith is the Balance Sheet and Summary Treasurer's Report December 2023. In review of the December financial reports for United Lutheran Church, note the following items:

Monthly Loan Payments are made via Electronic Fund Transfer from Regular Checking on the $\mathbf{1}^{st}$ of the month. Effective October 1, 2023 the interest rate increased from 4.125% to 6.375%. Based upon the loan principal October $\mathbf{1}^{st}$ the revised monthly payment amount beginning November $\mathbf{1}^{st}$ is \$1,193.90 . An additional \$1,000.00 is being applied to the monthly payment thereby maintaining the payment similar to that prior to the interest rate increase.
